☐ 1. COWPEN DAISY

I am a host plant to the Bordered Patch Butterfly! My seeds provide a food source for native birds during the winter! I get my name from my ability to easily sprout in disturbed areas-like the cowpen.

2. WHITE BRUSH

Also known as Common Bee Brush, I can be recognized by my white fragrant flowers! I grow on a spiky hedge-like shrub which is perfect for nests. I get my name from being a honey plant and attracting bees! If you smell a vanilla-scented flower on your walk, it is probably me!



☐ 3. CRUCITA/BLUE MIST

I am nectar rich and my flat top flower clusters serve as a perfect landing spot for pollinators of all shapes and sizes! I am a host plant for caterpillars! I can be found in shrubs and recognized by my sweet fragrant flowers.

4. HAIRY WEDELIA

I am known for my hairy stem and leaves. I am a host plant for Border Patch Butterflies and Cassius Blue Butterflies. I can be found in fields and woody areas.





☐ 5. TURK'S CAP

I attract many pollinators including hummingbirds! My fruit also provides a food source for birds and other mammals! My flowers can be seen all year round. My flowers are said to resemble a Turkish turban which is how I got my name!
